Biography

MÉLANIE LÉONARD

Born in Montreal, Mélanie Léonard is music director of Symphony New Brunswick and the Assistant Professor of instrumental conducting (contemporary music) at McGill University's Schulich School of Music. She was previously resident and associate conductor at the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra and Music Director at the Sudbury Symphony Orchestra.

As a guest conductor, she has worked with many institutions including the Montreal Symphony Orchestra, the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, Les Violons du Roy, Orchestre Metropolitan, the National Arts Center Orchestra, as well as symphony orchestras in Edmonton, Regina, Victoria, Winnipeg, Québec and Nova Scotia.

Ms. Léonard has worked on soundtracks for Aura at the Montreal Notre-Dame Basilica, Paradise City in South Korea, and for Cirque du Soleil's Land of Fantasy. Melanie has founded three contemporary music ensembles: Prima Ensemble, Wild West New Music Ensemble and the Calgary New Music Festival. In 2023-2024, Ms. Léonard will conduct Orchestre Métropolitain and the Saskatoon Symphony. She will also be making her début with the Ottawa Symphony Orchestra. Ms. Léonard was the first woman to complete a doctorate in orchestra conducting from University of Montreal. In 2012, she received the Canada Art Council's Jean-Marie Beaudet award for orchestral conducting.

Joel Miller is a Juno awardwinning jazz saxophonist and composer currently based in Fredericton, New Brunswick. With 10

albums to his credit and more than 160 original works registered with SOCAN over the past thirty years, Joel stands among the most prolific and highly respected jazz artists in Canada today.

He has led workshops on jazz improvisation and composition throughout North America as well as in Sweden, Norway and Peru. He is the recipient of over 30 grants for sound recording, composition, production and artist residencies from FACTOR, The Canada Council for the Arts, Musicaction, Conseil des arts et des lettres du Quebec, and Arts NB.

So far, Joel's work has earned over 15 music industry awards, including the 2013 Juno Award for Contemporary Jazz album of the year. He received a Master's in Jazz Performance from the Schulich School of Music at McGill University where he taught saxophone for over 15 years. Joel has appeared as featured composer and soloist on over 15 International broadcasts, and has performed with Geoffrey Keezer, Christine and Ingrid Jensen, Brian Blade, Kurt Rosenwinkel, Matt Wilson, Henry Hey, Denzal Sinclaire, Joé Armando, Tuco Bouzi and Dixie Band, Michael Bublé, and the Glenn Miller Orchestra.

Above all, Joel's compositions, improvisations, albums, and shows "... communicate joy, celebration, humour, and curiosity about our amazing planet".

ADRIAN VEDADY




Adrian Vedady is
Montreal's most indemand acoustic jazz
bassist. He is known for his
beautiful sound, his
soulfulness, and ability to
connect with a broad array
of musicians. In 2014, he
won a Juno award for best
jazz album with Mike Rud's
Notes on Montreal project.
In 2020, he won another
Juno award for best jazz
album with Jacques
Seguin's Migrations.

In 2022, he won an East Coast Music award for best jazz album with the Montreal Jazz Trio.

Over the years, Vedady has performed with international recognized artists such as Marc Copland, Dan Weiss, Peter Bernstein, Ingrid Jensen, Jean-Michel Pilc, Sheila Jordan, Chet Doxas, David Liebman, Ariel Pocock, Ravi Coltrane and George Colligan. He is the recipient of two composition grants from Conseil des arts et des lettres du Québec and a FACTOR recording grant in 2007 which led to the recording of his first album as a leader: In Three Acts.

SYLVIO PUPO

Known for dazzling crowds weekly at Halifax mainstay, The Local, pianist Silvio Pupo was born in Holguin, Cuba where he studied classical piano at the Professional School of Music. In 2009, Silvio moved to Atlantic Canada where was quickly sought after to by an array of East Coast artists, including Hot Toddy's bassist Tom Easley. Currently based in Moncton,



Silvio tours and records with artist like Ben Caplan Hepner and Alfie Zappacosta. He embodies a rare balance of complete musical confidence with flexibility, quick wit and charm.

JON BAILEY



Jon Bailey is a drummer/percussionist hailing from Fredericton, New Brunswick. He completed his Bachelor of Music degree in Percussion Performance at Acadia University in 2009. Upon graduating, he went on to pursue his passion for Cuban music in Havana, Cuba where he had the chance to study with some of the country's most celebrated percussionists. Following this, he spent four years working as a performer in the cruise ship industry, visiting over 50 countries. Currently, Jon enjoys freelancing in a variety of musical settings while also teaching music full-time in the Fredericton area.

The Best of Both Worlds

JOEL MILLER

I grew up in a musical family. Dad taught formal music composition at Mount Alison University. Mom loved jazz and dancing. I never imagined that one day I'd be playing my own jazz compositions with my own group and a symphony. I had privilege and a loving family. All the things I needed to fit in, but I struggled in school, didn't play sports, and felt quite different from most of the other kids in Sackville, NB. All that changed at age 10 when my brother handed me a saxophone. Music saved me.

The act of freely creating and experimenting with sound let me find my voice. Listening to and emulating jazz became my new language, which my Mom called Anglo-Saxophone. Playing saxophone in jazz and punk bands opened my world up as a way to connect with people. When Symphony New Brunswick was launched in 1983, I was hustling to raise funds to get my band to Toronto for a national competition (we got there!). It didn't even occur to me to dream that I could someday have my compositions played by a symphony orchestra AND have my own jazz quartet play on stage with them. My oldest brother was studying bass, maybe that was something he could do (he is!). Fast forward a few years, and I went off to McGill University and Montreal, and dedicated my life's work to jazz and its values of improvisation, exploration, sharing, and "from the people" origins. I was very much my mother's son.

After I became a father myself, I began to appreciate more clearly my own father's classical music world, with its values like craftmanship, creative orchestration and larger formal architecture. In 2015, I began a Master's at McGill, through the Jazz area, but I was seeking something outside of that, and was fortunate to be able to talk classically trained musicians into playing in a sort of chamber symphony that was my Master's project, and evolved into my most recent Junonominated/ECMA winning album UNSTOPPABLE. In fact, I was on the bus heading to the Montreal airport to fly to the Junos in March 2020 when I got a call, "Don't get on the plane - there's some virus and it looks like things will be cancelled." We all know what happened next... so many changes for so many people. For me, this led to coming home to New Brunswick, wondering "what next?" as touring was not an option, and so much else had changed.

When I began the conversation with conductor Mélanie Leonard, she invited my own quartet to play WITH the symphony. Holy smokes! At the same time: gulp. I didn't have a process in place to fully realize this invitation to have these two ensembles come together in an authentic way I wanted. To be honest, I thought the orchestra needed to listen to some key jazz recordings and well, had to loosen up. My ideas about composing in formal "classical" settings were about expanding my own pre-existing Jazz compositions mixed my own kind of pursuit of virtuosity. Excellence. I later came to realise that improvisation, my principal "jazz" value, the very thing that provided the structure and propulsion for how I led my own jazz groups, was very much alive and kicking in theatre and contemporary "classical" music. We share the same values. It just sounds and looks different.

I'm grateful to my partner Mel McCarthy, Symphony NB operations director Peter Sametz, and my brother Andrew Reed Miller, for pointing out that everything I needed was right here in New Brunswick: the time, the space, musicians willing to be outside their comfort zones, THANK YOU, we just needed a willingness to listen to understand. To (safely) make mistakes together. And to create something new and meaningful.

This concert is built on relationships, possibilities, and tremendous respect for trying things "both ways." I'm not promising perfection. I wish for a fun night of music and an authentic way for us being together. I'm truly thankful for this opportunity. Throughout 2023 Silvio Pupo, Adrian Vedady, Jon Bailey, my brother's ensemble Resonance, musicians from Symphony NB, had the luxury of time with support from ArtsNB, The Canada Council for the Arts, Fredericton Playhouse's InterMISSION artist residency to work the "chunks" of figuring out how to work together in way that included the best of both worlds. I hope you enjoy Symphonic Jazz as much as we enjoyed creating it.
